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Ticks



Ticks live off the blood of their host. They can cause infections and problems like anaemia.

These parasites often infest dogs and other animals. They cannot jump so they will often climb up grasses and shrubs waiting for an animal to brush past them. They can live for as long as two years without feeding. Young ticks can be mistaken for small spiders and engorged females drop off of their hosts to find a place to lay eggs. Some species of ticks reproduce without mating and can lay between two to five thousand eggs! Warmer months are when they are active so often our vets are treating animals like this poor dog. Once they start feeding they multiply rapidly.

Dentistry



All our in-patients get their teeth rasped (if they need it). We aim to look in the mouths of all the donkeys and horses that come to ACE.

Dental problems develop over time and owners often don't realise there is anything wrong with their animal's teeth. Just slight changes in the alignment of the teeth can go on to cause difficulties with eating. We encourage all owners to come to us to have their animals' mouths checked regularly to help prevent any problems.



This well cared for stallion arrived with chronic diarrhoea from a gut infection and was admitted for daily treatment as he was so unwell. He was hospitalised with us for ten days of care and made a good recovery.



Benjamin is receiving treatment for a carpus (knee) wound. He is very inquisitive but is not very appreciative of his treatment! He has a good prognosis.



This sweet colt was admitted with a fetlock wound which had become infected and had tracked deep into his fetlock joint. Daily internal flushing and antibiotics were part of his recovery programme.



Our vets have been working hard to save this donkey's tail. We have named him Stumpy.

He was unfortunately bitten at the base of his tail during an altercation with another male donkey working in close quarters with him.


When he arrived he had already been treated by a local who had attempted to re-attach the severed part of his tail with some sutures that looked like shoe laces! Our team removed them and once the bite was debrided the daily treatment to save his tail started. Stumpy has been making great progress so we will have to rename him 'Swishy'!






Some of our inpatients that have received care thanks to... **YOU** our supporters

Our Education Programme


