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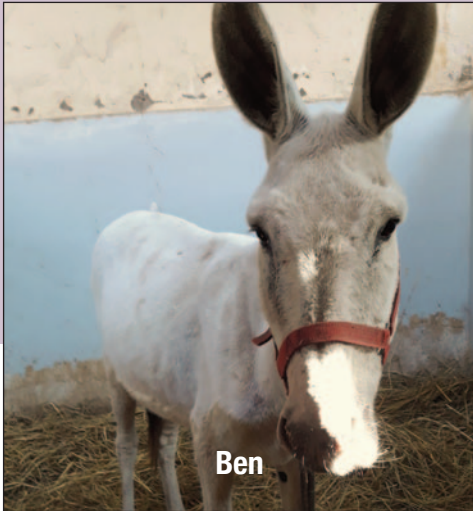
"I am currently in the final year of research for my PhD in working equine welfare and I am lucky enough to be staying at ACE for nine weeks.

My time at ACE will allow me to experience the day-to-day practicalities of running an equine welfare organisation in a place like Luxor. Working alongside the vets I will be able to see not only what the most common welfare problems are for animals here but also how they are treated. I will also experience how the charity is helping to prevent welfare problems in the future through owner education. While I'm here I will be collecting some data from the owners and animals that visit the clinic for my research; this aims to provide practical recommendations to equine welfare organisations on areas of programming to target in order to maximise their success in improving horse and donkey welfare. Of course, as a volunteer I'm also here to help in any way I can!

I have worked in many countries alongside teams from animal welfare charities but even I have been shocked by the condition of some of the animals here. It really underscores the need for the services that ACE provides and I'm very much looking forward to learning more about their amazing work."

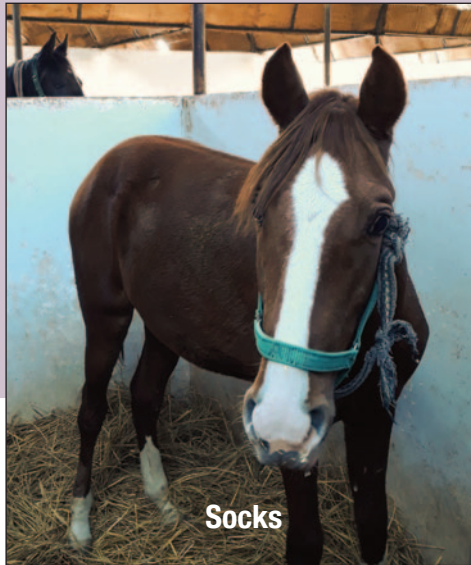
Over The Stable Door

Some of our inpatients that have received care thanks to... **you** our supporters



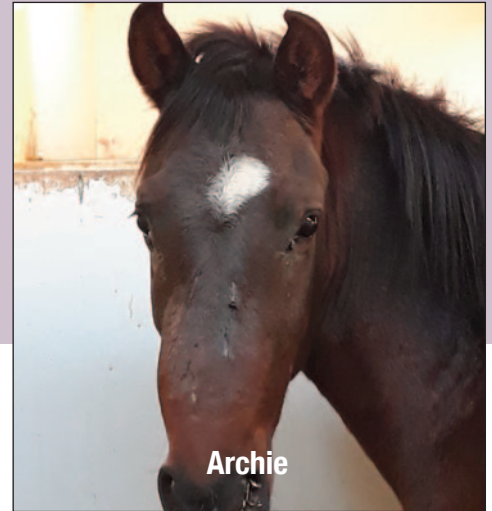
Ben

Road traffic accidents are a common occurrence here in Luxor and this poor lad received wounds and fractures to his face as a result. Archie was swollen for many days.



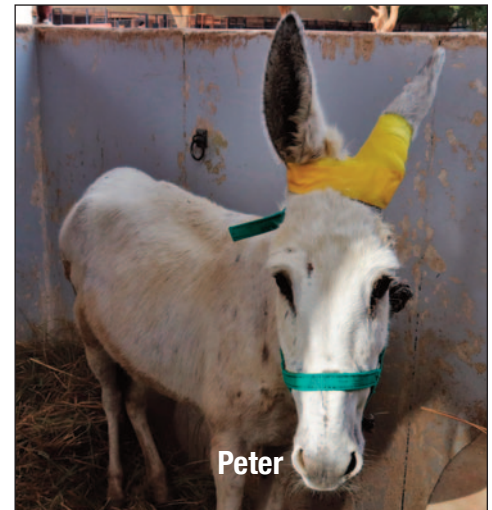
Coco

Making nose band covers for horses and donkeys in need

- 1 Cut fabric 11" wide x 5" deep.
- 2 Cut Velcro into 11" length strips.
- 3 Sew the length of velcro down one fluffy side. It needs to be sewn as glue deteriorates in the heat.
- 4 Sew the other side of the velcro on the cotton side so it is like a tube when the velcro is stuck together.

It is important that they are sewn robustly as they will see a fair amount of wear and tear! The tube makes a cover that can easily be put on and taken off nosebands or chains that can cause damage to soft noses. Once you have a batch ready please email:
