

# Over The Stable Door

Just a few of the working horses and donkeys that have received care at our hospital  
**thanks to YOU, our wonderful supporters...**



Charlie arrived with a huge abscess in his jaw. The team have taken x-rays to help them decide on the best treatment for Charlie. As you can imagine he is refusing to eat as this must be so painful when he tries to chew his food.



Cinderella is a carriage horse that is in desperately poor condition. Whilst taking sightseers on a trip around Luxor she fell in the street and has scraped the hair and skin off both of her front knees. This poor horse is also blind in one eye, probably caused by a trauma. We wish that tourists would be more responsible when choosing to use animals as a form of transport. We hope to be able to give her a long holiday from her miserable working life.



She is a hard-working donkey who pulls a vegetable cart through the back streets selling produce. Poor Esme was hit by a car and received a deep wound to her forehead. Thankfully her owner knew we would provide the veterinary care that Esme urgently needed. She is a sweet girl and does not make a fuss during her daily treatment.



At just six months old Timmy has had a bad start! He was bitten by a stallion not long after he was separated from his mother. The wound became infected before Timmy was brought to our hospital. Timmy is very nervous and doesn't trust humans. We will keep him with us for as long as his owner will allow.



This donkey is being treated for an infection in his hind leg that was caused by a male donkey bite. Because male donkeys here are rarely castrated, they fight to be the dominant leader and mate with the females.

Animal Care in Egypt (ACE) is a British charity dedicated to helping stop the suffering of thousands of animals in the poorest communities of Luxor by providing free veterinary care and education.

Due to rising costs in animal feed, medicines, fuel, electricity, water and almost every supply that you can think of, we are now calling upon our supporters to assist us.

Somehow, we need to find an **extra £2,000 each month** on top of what we are already receiving. Despite us now having over 12,000 followers on Facebook, we rarely receive donations from new supporters. ## Our Small Animal Clinic

Thanks to one of our wonderful supporters **Pamela Isdell** we are pleased to tell you that we have improved our operating room for companion animals.

The donation has allowed us to renew the work surface and replace all of the old wooden drawers as well as enabling us to purchase a hydraulic operating table. We have some more items on order so we will update you next year.

As you probably know, we offer a free spay and neuter service to help reduce the number of unwanted puppies and kittens. We are very pleased to tell you that many people are now being more responsible for their pets.

## Educating Owners

We often see animals that are badly treated or left too long with their injury before seeing us. The owners frequently protest that they didn't realise or that it doesn't matter – it can't feel it!

This lack of understanding is commonplace and something we are trying to change. Whenever we see an animal that should have come sooner or that has been abused our vets explain the reasoning and how this can be prevented in the future. This is a very important part of our work. While we can treat the animal in the present moment we also need to try and protect them for the future. Educating owners to have a better understanding and realising animals are just like us can help to reduce their suffering.
