This poor kitty was rushed to our hospital when her owner saw that she was in need of help.


An X-Ray revealed that she had eaten some chicken and a bone was lodged in her larynx, just in front of her trachea.






Oscar is healing well after being admitted with a deep face wound that he received in a traffic accident.

General Volunteering at ACE

We are mother and daughter, Bea and Bex, who spent a week as general volunteers at the end of January this year.

Why did we volunteer at ACE?

Between us we have visited/volunteered at animal welfare establishments in Romania, Nepal, Kosovo, Madagascar and Egypt. We have an animal sanctuary in Devon with rescue horses, ponies, sheep, poultry, dogs and one brave cat adopted from one of our fostered litters for the Blue Cross. Bea worked in an international business and in the UK not-for-profit sector. Bex has degrees in zoology and works in fundraising for the RSPCA in Exeter.

We were initially interested due to a recommendation from our friend and ACE supporter, Ann Spencer. We really admire how long ACE has been established (since 2000) and the number of supporters. We felt we could help with bringing supplies and lending basic support even without any vet training. Having spent several weeks at EEA in Giza in 2017 we had an idea of the challenges in Luxor. The UNESCO World Heritage sites in Luxor were a definite draw. WOW! We were not disappointed!

How did we get there?

We flew from Heathrow directly to Luxor on EgyptAir to take advantage of the generous luggage allowance, filling four bags with everything from nose bands to scalpels. Generous donors made sure our bags were full of useful supplies. Kim picked us up from the airport and we felt safe and well cared for throughout our stay. Our return was by car (you can get a bus) across the desert to Hurghada and then EasyJet back to Bristol with our backpacks.

Through planning the trip and collecting donations we have met lots of interesting and dedicated ACE

supporters. The pre-arrival information was complete and very helpful. Helen always responded quickly to our guestions. Our twin bed ensuite apartment was comfortable with a good shared kitchen too.

What did we gain from the visit?

We were impressed and delighted to meet Kim and her team. The vets and staff are all incredibly dedicated and hard-working. We were invited to observe and assist with everything from morning rounds with inpatients (holding heads and bandages, stroking faces, leading in and out as appropriate) to fitting nose bands and donuts under harnesses to outpatients. With our home experience with newborn kittens we were able to be 'hands on' with a litter of newborn pups whose mother had died giving birth cleaning, first bottle feed and advice to the caring human family. We had lots of questions and interesting chats with the vets about their patients. Yes, the wounds and conditions of the equines can be distressing but they were all so well cared for at ACE (a caring respite from their working lives), that it was fantastic to see it all first hand, in action.

Would we do it again? YES!

What you should know!

Life in Luxor is very hard for animals and humans but what ACE offers is truly inspiring and makes a difference to so many. We felt welcome and supported and wholly recommend volunteering. Staying in one of the apartments really lets you know how the charity operates. However, even a day visit if you don't want to be 'hands-on' is well worth your time and is very encouraging to the team.
