



Thank you to everyone who contributed towards their care.





over the Stable Door


Some of our inpatients that have received care thanks to... **you** our supporters



We treat many horses and donkeys that have developed an abscess for a variety of reasons. Hospitalisation is often needed to provide daily treatment until the infection is eradicated.



Sukkar damaged the fetlock on her front leg and is very lame but with the help from our vets she has a good prognosis and will soon be able to go home.




This male donkey was in an altercation with another un-gelded male resulting in wounds on his face as well as an ulcerated eye.

Our History

For those of our supporters who are unaware of our origins, here is a brief overview...

"In life we often see things that we would like to change, but to get the opportunity to totally change your life around and put your ideas into action is rare."

Have you ever felt like your heart was going to break? That sensation when you see something you just can't imagine possible and have no control over? That's exactly what happened when Kim Taylor and her Aunt Julie Wartenburg were on holiday in Egypt. They saw small underfed donkeys suffering from neglect by the very owners who needed them so badly. Animals were being beaten in the street and horses with raw skin being worked with the very harness that caused the damage.

Kim and Julie felt they couldn't simply leave knowing there were so many animals needing help, and Animal Care in Egypt evolved. Julie used her retirement package as a set up cost for the new charity which enabled ACE to rent a small piece of land and build a washing area, as well as donating a large sum of her own money towards the running costs in the first few years. Julie worked tirelessly to organise all the paperwork needed to set up a charity in Egypt and the UK, along with relentlessly fundraising to ensure the future of ACE.

Today...


